Bid Analysis: East makes a takeout double showing an opening hand (at least 10 HCP with the right distribution). South raises to 2♠ showing 6 to bad 10 HCP. North has 17 good HCP with a singleton, so goes to game. West should not bid freely as that would show at least 6 HCP.

Your lead?

Suggested opening lead: ♥ King

Lead analysis: A spade lead would be more successful on these cards, but it would be a bad lead. Don't play results. You should lead top of a sequence. It is seldom correct to lead a trump.

Plan your play.

Play analysis: Against a heart lead, obviously win it. You can ruff a heart and play diamond to the ♦ Ace and ruff another heart, but then what? You can't get back to your hand without giving up the lead and defense should lead a trump and you still have a heart loser. East probably has the ♣ Ace, so play a club at trick 2. Hopefully, that establishes ♣ King for a discard.

Best defense after seeing dummy is to lead trumps. Even if West wins club and leads back a trump, you can still ruff 2 hearts. You can ruff clubs to get back to North hand. You should catch 5 spades, 1 heart, ruff 2 hearts, 2 diamonds, and 1 club.

Summary: 4♠ by North should catch 11 tricks

Bid Analysis: To overcall vulnerable at the two level, you need close to an opening hand or better, so South should not overcall 2♣. There will be different opinions on what the West response should be. A case could be made for 2♦, 2♠, 3♠, or 4♠. Nevertheless, I recommend 4♠. The age old rule of thumb is this bid shows at least 5 trumps, 5-10 HCP, an ace outside the trump suit, and a singleton outside the trump suit (so, I fudged 1 spade). I think this is the most descriptive bid and won't be misinterpreted by partner. If you bid 2♦ or 3♠, partner with a strong hand may go to slam. If you bid 2♠, your partner could pass and your hand is much too good to play 2♠. West should want to be in game when partner opens, so just bid it.

Your lead?

Suggested opening lead: ♣ King

Lead analysis: Top of sequence. You only have 2 in the

sequence, but many times leading from King, Queen is a good lead.

Plan your play.

Play analysis: South should switch to a spade at trick two to cut down dummy's ruffing ability. Actually, North should overtake the ♠ King at trick one to lead a spade, in case South had K x in spades. For declarer this is an example of not calling trumps right away. Declarer has 1 diamond trick and 1 heart trick, so needs 8 spade tricks to make the contract. You need 3 club ruffs in dummy. Win the second trick in your hand and ruff a club. Play ♦ Ace sluffing a heart. Play ♥ Ace and ruff a club. Ruff a diamond and ruff a club. Claim 3 more spade tricks, conceding 2 hearts. Making 4.

Summary: 4♠ by East should catch 10 tricks.

Bid Analysis: East opens 1♥ showing at least 5 hearts and an opening hand. West bids 2♥ showing at least 3 hearts and 6-10 points. East hand fits into the maximum range of 19-21, so bids 4♥ because the combined hands should have the 26 points needed for game.

Your lead?

Suggested opening lead: ♠ Jack

Lead analysis: Top of a sequence. Only choice on this holding.

Plan your play.

Play analysis: On every hand you should count your winners and losers, but on this hand, counting your losers and finding a way to get rid of them is more important than winners. Your winners are 2 spades, 4 hearts, 2 diamonds, and 4 clubs. However, your losers are 1 spade, 2 hearts, and 1 diamond. You have to figure out how to catch 10 of your winners before the defense catches their 4 tricks. Against decent defense, there is nothing you can do about the heart and diamond losers. The defense should play another spade when in with the first heart lead and take their spade winner and ♦ Ace when they get a chance. So, you should not call trumps right away. The best way to get rid of a loser is to play a diamond at trick 2. If they don't win it, your diamond loser goes away. If they win it and lead a spade, lead a low club to the dummy and sluff a spade on a diamond. THEN, call trumps.

Should catch 10 tricks. ♦

# It Doesn't Always Pay to Think Too Much

I was declarer in 4♠ recently with the following cards:

Dummy  
 ♠ K Q x x  
 ♥ J x x x  
 ♦ A x  
 ♣ A K Q

Declarer  
 ♠ 10 9 x x  
 ♥ K x x

 ♣ x x

West led the ♣ Jack, and the hand looked relatively easy: No losers in the minor suits with reasonable prospects to lose only one spade and two hearts at most (after discarding a low heart on the ♣ Queen). If the ♥ Ace was on my right, 11 tricks would be easy!

Just to be cautious, I began to look beneath the surface, deep into the inner problems of the hand. What if the ♠ Ace and ♠ Jack were on my right? That would mean four losers including the two possible hearts. Even if East held only ♠ A x, if he also had only two little hearts, he could win the first trump lead with the ♠ Ace, then lead through my ♥ King to his partner's ♥ A Q and get a heart ruff! That would also be four losers.

Still not satisfied, I looked deeper into the intricacies of the hand. What if East held the ♠ A J x x as well as a doubleton heart? I'd lose the ♠ Ace and ♠ Jack, the ♥ Ace and ♥ Queen on my left, and a heart ruff by East—down two in a contract that seemed so easy at first!

Convinced of the perils that lay ahead, I decided to cash my seven minor-suit winners (discarding a heart from hand), take the ♠ King or ♠ Queen and try to establish two trump tricks by ruffing a diamond in dummy or hearts in my hand. Surely, with the adverse distribution that awaited me, this would be the safest course.

Everything worked as planned until East ruffed my ♦ Queen with a small trump, cashed the ♥ Ace and continued with a heart to my ♥ King. When I next led a

spade to the ♠ King, East won the ♠ Ace and returned a heart. I ruffed with the ♠ 10 but was over-ruffed by West's ♠ Jack, ending up down one, having lost the ♥ Ace and the ♠ Ace, a diamond ruff, and a heart over-ruff. I was relieved to be down only one in such a shaky contract.

The actual layout was:
